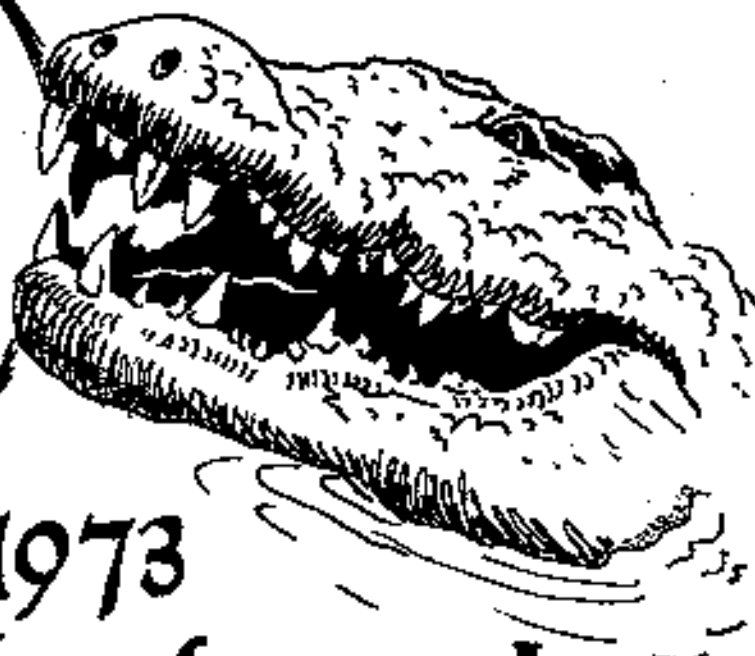

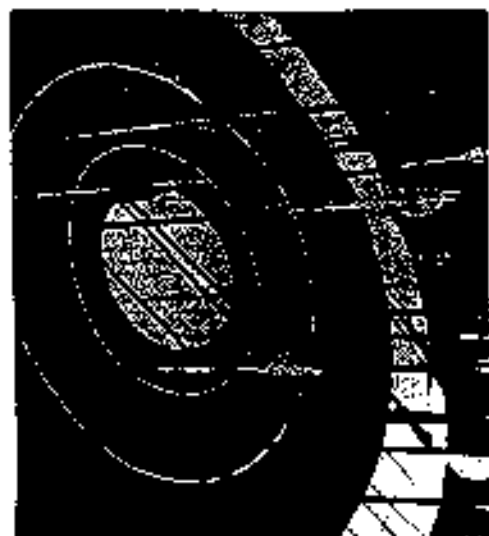

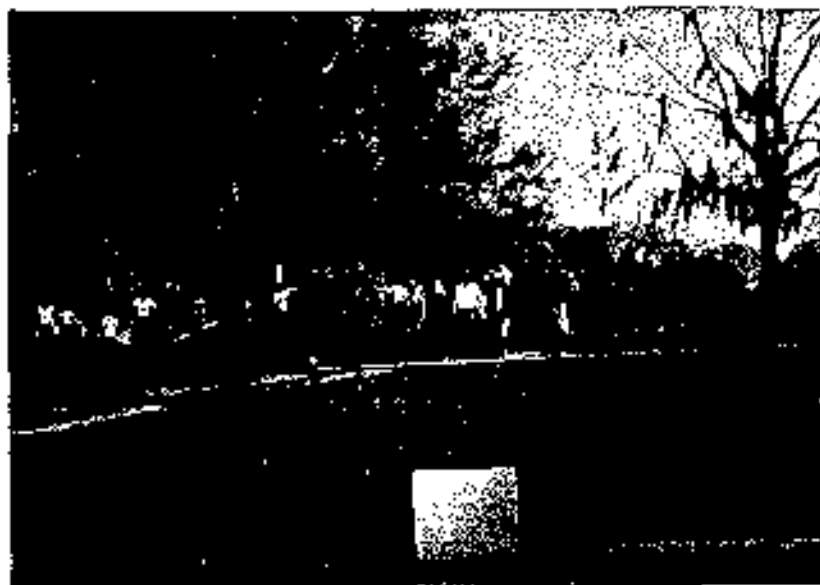

UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS

The 1972-73 year has been one of involvement for the University of Arkansas at Monticello Forestry Club. During the National S.A.F. Convention which was held at Hot Springs, Arkansas, the Forestry Club undertook the job of co-hosting, and providing assistant services for the convention chairmen. Some of our responsibilities were ushering for convention presentations, convention message services, and operating chauffeur services for the complimentary cars. We learned a great deal about the S.A.F.

To finance expenses for conclave, the club undertook pulpwood operations in the Monticello vicinity. Using organizational equipment, we cut, bucked, and loaded the sticks onto pallets which were then hauled by local pulp contractors.

In addition to the pulpwooding operation, the organization sold programs at the home football games. A float was constructed for the homecoming parade which is held annually.

MISSISSIPPI STATE UNIVERSITY

NORTH CAROLINA STATE

The N.C. State Forestry Club and the School of Forest Resources now have a new headquarters. It is Biltmore Hall, named in honor of Carl A. Schenck's famous Forestry School of the past which began in the Biltmore Forests of North Carolina. The new building was occupied in the Spring of 1971 and has since been a great asset to the students in their search for greater knowledge.

The N.C. State Forestry Club has also taken on a new image. It seems the club has traded in pulpwood hooks and bob tailed pulpwood trucks of the past for climbing spikes, ropes, and Swedish ladders. The club has taken on the challenge of tree job work. The club began this new adventure last fall (1972) and this work has taken precedence over most of the pulpwood work for fund raising. The work has proven very profitable, both in money and in very valuable experience to the club members.

The club is in its 44th year of service to the Forestry School and is one of the most active clubs in the University. Equipping and maintaining of its own equipment, including 6 chain saws, makes the club very active and busy.

The club sponsors an annual Spring Dance called the Logger's Brawl, which last spring drew about 175 people. The club also had their own pig roast and a dance last fall semester to allow the members to socialize a little after hard work in the tree tops.

Other activities of the N.C. State University Forestry Club include the annual fall Rolleo, which is class competition to help prepare teams for the Conclave, a Paul Bunyan Homecoming float, Open House with the School of Agriculture and Life Sciences, Open House for Forest Resource students only, and a Big Brother Membership Drive to acquaint freshmen to the club. The Rolleo received newspaper coverage by two large newspapers and drew over 100 people, despite the rain that goes with the Rolleo (has not failed in 7 years).

Membership is not as large as it has been in the past which means that the members have to work even harder to keep things rolling smoothly. The N.C. State Forestry Club has met the challenge of harder work and the challenge of change in its work and activities. The members of the N.C. State University Forestry Club would like to express their sincere appreciation to all the faculty and advisors who have supported and helped the Club in its plannings and projects, and who have never ceased to be of benefit to the members and students.



STEPHEN F. AUSTIN STATE

The Stephen F. Austin S.U. SYLVANS FORESTRY CLUB has had a 72-73 school year full of social and practical applied forestry activities.

Socially, the weekends have seen us at our Sylvans Cabin celebrating and letting off some of the tension that builds up over the week from arduous scholastic endeavors. We also have work projects on the weekends that range from yardwork to complete tree surgery and removal.

We are the sponsors of Lumberjack Day field events for SFASU's annual Homecoming. This year our float, "The Sylvan's Golden Bridge to the Past, 1923-1973" was one of the top winners and largest floats of the 50th anniversary Homecoming Day Parade. Our annual Parents' Day festivities and barbeque had a tremendous turnout of over 500 parents and students.

The SYLVANS CLUB assists in the publication of the weekly School of Forestry newspaper, the "Knothole", and also the annual yearbook (of the College East of Raguet St.), "The Texas Tally".



UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA

As host of the 1973 A.S.F.C. Conclave, the University of Florida Forestry Club has had a busy and exciting year.

Our Club activities during the past year have been primarily focused on preparations for Conclave. Some of the activities to raise funds to cover Conclave expenses were: a candle sale in the fall quarter and a pulpwood cut during the winter quarter. To prepare our Club for Conclave competition, we held our Annual Field Day in February.

Money was raised by cutting firewood from Jefferson National Forest and more volunteers for fighting forest fires were obtained on account of forestry students attending the Fire School on Brush Mountain.

The Forestry Club meetings were informative as well as entertaining and we had the pleasure of having John Beal, Executive Vice President of the Society of American Foresters, to speak.

By bringing members in contact with each other, the faculty, the profession, and the university, the Forestry Club is serving both its members and the university.



OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY

The Club's activities this year began with the Log Jam. The Log Jam is an annual event consisting of a meal of barbequed chicken, demonstration of some of the Conclave events, and lots of fellowship. The primary purpose of the Log Jam is for the Club members to get acquainted with the new queen candidates.

UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA

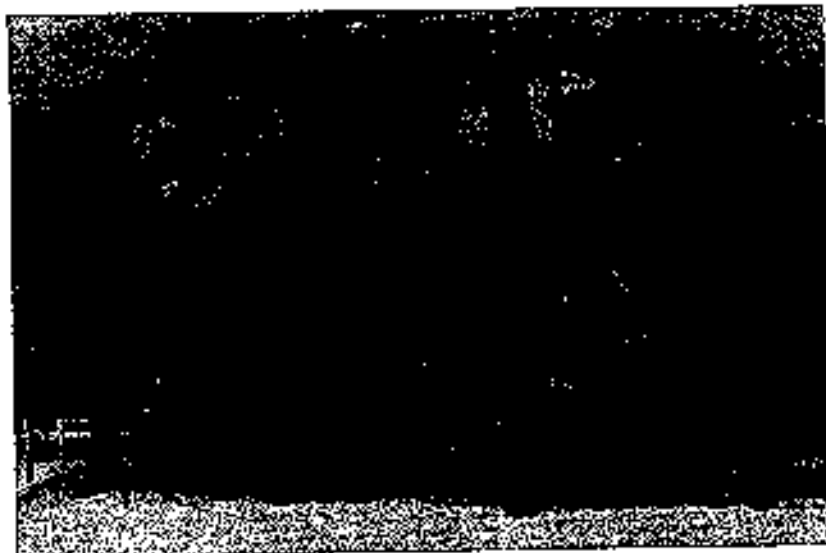
The School of Forest Resources at the University of Georgia has an active and dedicated Forestry Club. The Club was formed in 1914 and produced the first annual in 1916. During the school year 1925-1926, two significant events occurred. First, the "Forestry Cabin" was built and the first female, Jane Oakly, was admitted to the school. Miss Oakly's stay at the school was short. She never graduated because she met and married a rich young lad from New York. Another female first occurred this year when a Forest Resources major, Miss Stephanie Watkins, was chosen University of Georgia Homecoming Queen.

The activities of the Club are many and varied. The Club organized a student-faculty gripe session which has evolved into the Student-Faculty Interaction Committee. This group is an important communications channel within the school. Each year the Club coordinates a Miss School of Forest Resources Beauty Pageant, the annual Field Day, and the Lumberjack Ball.

Throughout the year the Forestry Club has sponsored several cook-outs to promote fellowship among forestry students. A successful tree sale was also sponsored. Forestry Clubbers sold and planted trees for many residents in Athens.

The Club elects a president, vice president, treasurer, and secretary. The president appoints members to head the various committees that must be formed to carry out the Club's activities. The Club also elects two representatives to the Ag Hill Council.

Because of the informal nature of the Club and the good lines of communication within the school, the Forestry Club of the University of Georgia has something to offer every student in the School of Forest Resources.



GLEMSON UNIVERSITY

The Clemson University Forestry Club was organized in 1957 by the Class of '59. The club, which originally started with seven members, today has an enrollment of fifty members. The club's purpose is to bring about a closer relationship among the forestry students and the faculty of the University and to promote interest in and to advance knowledge of forestry in the University.

The 40 active members of the club enjoy the bimonthly meetings which consist of business sessions and special programs. The members also enjoy intramural sports, initiation of new members, and cookouts. The club raises funds for its activities by cutting and selling firewood and pulpwood.

Two local conclaves are held each year, and initiation of new members follows each conclave. The club builds a Homecoming display each fall and travels to the ASFC Regional Conclave each Spring.

The club offers its members fellowship, leadership training, and recreation. It is one of the most active clubs on campus.

Motion was made by Florida to accept the rotation of host schools and dates as follows:

- 1979 - Clemson University
- 1980 - University of Arkansas

- 1983 - Oklahoma State University
- 1984 - University of Florida

Motion carried.

Dendrology -- A motion was made by VPI to delete the words, "and variety" from rule #5 and change the point system to read, "One point will be awarded for each correct family, genus, and species named, with -1/2 deducted for each misspelled word."

Compass and pacing -- A motion was made by Florida to add the words, "and will run only one course" to rule #2. Motion carried.

Timber estimation -- A motion was made by Oklahoma to add the words, "at least two weeks before conclave date" to rule #5. Motion carried.

Pole classification -- A motion was made by Florida to add the words, "at least two weeks before conclave date" to rule #4. Motion carried.

Archery -- A motion was made by Stephen F. Austin that each contestant will shoot 1/5 of the Junior American Round, i.e. 6 arrows will be shot at each 30, 40 and 50 yard stations. Motion carried. A motion was made by Oklahoma to change rule #6 to read, "Only conventional hunting bows with a pull of 40 pounds or greater at 28 inches and a maximum length of 64 inches may be used." Motion carried.

Wildlife -- A motion was made by Oklahoma to continue the use of the existing rules for this event for one more year, after which they would be reassessed. Motion carried.

Log birling -- A motion was made by Arkansas to delete rule #8 and establish a double elimination judging system. This system is to be investigated and a decision reached by North Carolina before the 1974 conclave. Motion carried.

Wood technology -- A motion was made by VPA to allow 40 minutes for the 20 quiz woods with a 2 minute limit for each sample. Motion carried.

A motion was made by North Carolina that a photogrammetry event be entered in the 1974 conclave on a trial basis. The host school, NCS, will establish and distribute the rules for the event to all member schools by January 1, 1974. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Clemson to correct the list of standard events under ARTICLE VIII of the constitution to include: pole felling, archery and log birling. Motion carried.

A. S. F. C. CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. NAME.

The name of the organization shall be the Association of Southern Forestry Clubs.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES.

- A. To benefit the forestry clubs of the various southern schools by an interchange of ideas and stimulation of good fellowship among the club members.
- B. To establish and maintain:
 - 1. Unity of purpose and action within and among the southern forestry clubs.
 - 2. A high standard of professional ethics.
 - 3. Closer cooperation and relationship between students and professional foresters.
- C. To hold an annual conclave.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP.

- A. Qualifications.
 - 1. Any forestry club of a university or college of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, or West Virginia granting a baccalaureate degree in forestry, or equivalent, with a major of forestry, or a higher degree in forestry, shall be eligible for voting membership in this association upon a majority approval of a petition submitted to the voting member clubs; or by application by representation at the Annual Conclave.
 - 2. Charter Members: Louisiana State University, University of Florida, Stephen F. Austin State College, Mississippi State University, Oklahoma State University, University of the South, University of Arkansas at Monticello, Auburn University, University of Georgia, North Carolina State College, and Clemson Agricultural College.
 - 3. Any Forestry Club of a senior university or college within the state listed in Part 1 of this section not granting a baccalaureate degree in forestry, shall be eligible for associate membership upon a majority approval of a petition submitted to the voting member clubs.
- B. Privileges.

Member (each club) are entitled to one vote and full participation in all conclave activities.
- C. Dues.
 - 1. The Annual dues shall be one hundred (\$100) dollars for each member club. Entering clubs shall pay a reduced rate to be set by the Association.
 - 2. The dues shall be used to pay for correspondence, publications, and other association expenses of the host club and any excess funds may be the host club's.
 - 3. The dues for the year will be paid to the host school by January 1, preceding the Conclave.

ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS.

- A. The officers of the association shall be:

A. S. F. C. CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. NAME.

The name of the organization shall be the Association of Southern Forestry Clubs.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES.

- A. To benefit the forestry clubs of the various southern schools by an interchange of ideas and stimulation of good fellowship among the club members.
- B. To establish and maintain:
 - 1. Unity of purpose and action within and among the southern forestry clubs.
 - 2. A high standard of professional ethics.
 - 3. Closer cooperation and relationship between students and professional foresters.
- C. To hold an annual conclave.

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ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS.

- A. The officers of the association shall be:

1. President - elected from and by the host club.
 2. Vice-President - one elected from any by each member club.
 3. Secretary - elected from and by the host club.
 4. Treasurer - elected from and by the host club.
 5. Editor - elected from and by the host club.
- B. The duties of the officers.
1. The duties of the President shall be:
 - a. To preside at all meetings of the association.
 - b. To appoint committees.
 - c. To be responsible for submitting an officers report to the accumulative files upon the completion of ASFC Conclave.
 - d. To be responsible for obtaining reports from each of his committees and officer heads of the host club.
 - e. To perform all other duties necessary.
 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be:
 - a. To act as a representative of his club.
 - b. To notify the president of his election.
 - c. To complete a report of the activities of the association, and be responsible for submitting materials to the host club for annual publication.
 - d. To be responsible for submitting to member clubs publications within his club and maintaining an accumulative file of ASFC correspondence.
 3. The duties of the Secretary shall be:
 - a. To keep the minutes of all meetings of the association and to conduct all correspondence relative to the business of the association.
 - b. To submit an officer's report for the accumulative files, completion of the ASFC Conclave.
 4. The duties of the Treasurer shall be:
 - a. To receive and have custody of all money paid to the association.
 - b. To keep a careful record of all receipts and expenditures.
 - c. To prepare a financial report for publication in the annual issue of "THE SOUTHERN FORESTER".
 - d. To be responsible for the collection of dues.
 5. The duties of the Editor shall be:
 - a. To gather and edit all material for the annual publication, "THE SOUTHERN FORESTER".
 - b. To see that the provisions of Article VII are carried out.
- C. Tenure of Office.
Officers are to hold office until the next Annual Conclave with the exception of the editor, who will serve until the publication is distributed.
- D. Election of Officers.
1. The President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Editor of the Association shall be elected by the host club at their first club meeting following the Conclave.
 2. Vice Presidents of the Association shall be elected by their respective clubs at their first meeting following the Conclave.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS.

A. Time of Meetings.

1. The business meeting will be held on the Friday preceding the ASFC field day.

2. The exact time of the meetings is to the discretion of the host club.
- B. Election of Host Club.
1. The host club shall be selected from bids submitted by member clubs at each annual meeting by a roll call majority vote two years in advance.
 2. In case of tie, the president shall cast the deciding vote.
 3. No club shall be host more than once in three years.
 4. If a previously elected host notifies the members of the ASFC, by October 1 of the year before it is to hold the conclave, that it cannot hold the conclave, the president shall solicit bids from the members and then send a ballot to each member club to be voted on in writing.
 5. The host club shall be alternated from east to west whenever possible.
- C. Files.
1. Accumulative files shall be maintained by the host club and shall include all member reports and correspondence.
 2. Each file shall contain a copy of the ASFC Constitution.

ARTICLE VI. AMENDMENTS.

The constitution may be amended or revised by a two-thirds vote of the voting member clubs.

ARTICLE VII. PUBLICATIONS.

- A. Title. The title of the publication shall be "THE SOUTHERN FORESTER".
- B. The constitution shall be published annually in the publication of "THE SOUTHERN FORESTER."
- C. The past host club shall publish the ASFC periodical within one month after the Annual Conclave.
- D. Securing items for publications.
1. The articles shall be edited by the member club and submitted to the host club.
 2. Article to be printed in the current issue must be in the hands of the publishing editor not later than the time of the Annual Conclave.
- E. Distribution. Each conclave contestant will receive one (1) copy of "THE SOUTHERN FORESTER." A minimum of twenty (20) will be sent to participating member clubs.
- F. Proceeding of the Conclave. Proceedings of each Annual Conclave, including minutes of the business meetings, will be published by the past host club in the annual publication.

ARTICLE VIII. CONTESTS.

- A. Competitive events will be held at each Annual Conclave.
- B. There will be 18 standard competitive contests at each Annual Conclave.
1. Standard events:
 - a. Dendrology
 - b. Compass and pacing
 - c. Timber estimation
 - d. D.B.R. estimation
 - e. Pole classification

- f. Wood technology
- g. Chain throwing
- h. Axe throwing
- i. Knife throwing
- j. Pole climbing
- k. Bow sawing
- l. Log rolling
- m. Cross-cut sawing
- n. Log chipping
- o. Bait casting
- p. Pole felling
- q. Log birling
- r. Archery

2. Scoring will be based on the number of schools participating in the Conclave. First place winners in field events will be awarded a number of points equal to the total number of schools participating. Second place winners receive 1 less point than the total number of participating schools, third place winners will receive 2 less points than the total number of participating schools, and so on with each succeeding participant who satisfactorily completes the event receiving one or more points. First place winners in technical events will be awarded a number of points equal to the number of participating schools multiplied by 1.5. Second place winners will receive 1.5 points less than the total number of points awarded first place winners, third place winners will receive 3 points less than the total number of points awarded first place winners, and so on with each succeeding participant who satisfactorily completes the event receiving 1.5 or more points.
- C. In addition to the 18 standard events established in Section B, there may be a maximum of five (5) contests at the discretion of the host club, provided that these contests be specified with rules and explanations at the preceding Annual Conclave. Requests for omission of any standard contests will be made at the preceding Annual Conclave with a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote necessary for approval.
 - D. The standard set of rules will be made and approved by the voting members of the ASFC.
 - E. Selection of judges of all contests will be left to the discretion of the host club except in the event the host club participates; then judging will not be done by members of the host club.
 - F. Only students presently enrolled in a school or department of forestry will be eligible to enter ASFC events. In the case the University of Florida and the University of the South, freshman and sophomore students presently enrolled and who have declared an intention of enrolling in the forestry department or school at the beginning of their junior year will also be eligible for participation.
 - G. The contestant must meet the same requirements as are specified for individual participation in school athletics. The contestant must be an undergraduate student and he must meet his own school's requirements both scholastically and in credit for athletic participation.
 - H. In the event that the Conclave delegation or spectators from any member school intentionally or otherwise interfere with the progress of any event in the Conclave, that delegation shall forfeit the rights to score any points in that event.

- I. VPI is hereby considered a member of the ASFC by vote taken on May 4, 1963.
- J. A table of random numbers will be used to choose order of team's participation in each event. This order will be sent to each participating school before the Conclave.
- K. Contest protests must be filed with a committee of staff members within fifteen (15) minutes of the individual infraction. The protest committee shall be composed of three (3) staff members of schools within the Association. They shall be appointed by the host school and cannot serve as judge in any event.
- L. Contestants in the log chopping event must wear hard-toed footwear. The use of shin guards is left to the individual's discretion.
- M. Tennessee is hereby considered a member of the ASFC by unanimous vote taken on April 8, 1967.
- N. The University of the South is hereby no longer considered a member of the ASFC after the submission of a letter of resignation on April 12, 1969.
